olicing career is a calling that requires selflessness, dedication, resilience and commitment from an individual police officer.

A police officer has to be well equipped with the necessary knowledge of law, must be physically and mentally fit, with the necessary survival skills to manoeuvre challenges when duty calls.

Botswana Police College is mandated to amongst others to train police officers from the recruitment stage. The recruits are trained to become police officers who are able to execute their policing duties effectively. They are prepared to face any challenging environment they may encounter during the execution of their duties.

During training, recruits do subjects related to law and police duties amongst others in the curriculum; perform physical training that include survival and defence tactics, drill movements and many others.

In December 2021, the College graduated 339 battle-ready recruit constables to join thousands other officers in the war against crime. The officers holding qualifications in various disciplines passed out in a spectacular event that was marked by ululations.

The sharp commands of the instructors could be heard from afar as the recruits performed their drill moves with precision. The gratifying drill movements exhibited teamwork, which is one of the key components of training.

The graduates, both male and female could be barely distinguished, with bald heads, slim bodies and dark complexion emanating from the robust training they went through.

SARPCCO Chairperson on a Monitoring Mission

he Chairperson of the Southern African Regional Police Chiefs Cooperation Organisation (SARPCCO) who is also the National Commissioner of South African Police Service (SAPS), General John Khehla Sitole hailed cooperation that exists between Botswana Police Service (BPS) and South African Police Service (SAPS) in terms of policing.

the official opening of a two-day meeting meant to monitor the implementation of SARPCCO resolutions in Gaborone, Botswana recently.

The resolutions were reached at the 26th Chiefs of Police Sub-Committee of the Inter-Meeting that was held on the 16th of June 2021 in Gaborone, Botswana. Some of the resolutions were to enhance operational efficiency on; preventing and combating illicit firearms, ammunition and other related materials in the region, prevent

and combat transnational organised crime as well as fighting cybercrime in the SADC region. The development of SARPCCO Women's Network Strategic Plan 2021-2025 was also endorsed at the meeting.

organised crime continues to threaten regional peace and security thus calling countries to strengthen their working relations by devising new crime reduction strategies amongst others.

He also added that it remains critical for regional security structures to continuously collaborate, formulate, implement and review as necessary joint crime counter strategies that would address emerging regional security challenges.

Gen. Sitole who attained the SARPCCO chairmanship virtually in June last year, said the aim of the SARPCCO Chiefs of Police is to turn the organisation into a regional policing model of the world. He urged all SARPCCO member states to rise to the occasion and become a best practice model in which the whole world can begin to learn from.

During his monitoring expedition, the Chairperson paid a courtesy call on the Minister of Defence, Justice and Security, Honourable Thomas Kagiso Mmusi, toured the INTERPOL National Central Bureau (NCB) in Gaborone. He also appreciated the services rendered through the INTERPOL's secure global police communications network, I-24/7 at Tlokweng Border Gate.

Africa formed in 1995 in Zimbabwe to amongst others; promote, strengthen and perpetuate collaboration and foster joint strategies for the management of all forms of crime in the region.

For his part, the Commissioner of Botswana Police Service, Mr Keabetswe Makgophe said Botswana and South Africa have a long standing cordial relationship demonstrated by the existence of Embassies in the two countries. He also stated that the constant collaboration through bilateral meetings, joint operations and intelligence sharing continues to contribute significantly towards fighting transnational organised

Mr Makgophe further said South African Police Service is instrumental in joint investigations and apprehension of offenders especially in crimes that involve the two countries.

He said Botswana Police Service continues foreign nationals who then skip borders after committing crime.



SARPCCO Sword of Honour Changes Hands

he Commissioner of Botswana Police Service (BPS), Mr Keabetswe Makgophe officially handed over the SARPCCO chairmanship Sword of Honour to the National Commissioner of South African Police Service (SAPS), General John Khehla Sitole in Gaborone, Botswana recently.

When handing over the sword, the former chairperson of SARPCCO, Mr Keabetswe Makgophe said that it was important to physically hand over the baton to the South African Police Service National Commissioner.

He said that the sword was virtually handed over at the 26th Chiefs of Police Sub-Committee of the Inter-State, Defence and Security Annual General Meeting that was held on the 16th of June 2021 in Gaborone.

Mr Makgophe added that this owed to the COVID-19 pandemic that forced countries to impose restrictions as a way of avoiding the spread of the disease.

Botswana Police Commissioner steered the rotational ship of regional policing for a period of 12 months taking over from the Commissioner General of the Zimbabwe Republic Police, Tandabantu Godwin Matanga in August 2020.

During his tenure, he adapted the new philosophy of policing owing to the advent of COVID-19 pandemic which led to change of policing business.

Some of the successful joint operations conducted under the auspices of SARPCCO during his reign included; Operation OPSON X aimed at addressing fake

and substandard food and beverages, Operation Basadi geared towards addressing Gender Based Violence, Operation LIONFISH MIHARTI II targeting drug trafficking along air, land and maritime routes.

So was Operation AFYA II combating illicit goods and Operation Pangea XIV against counterfeit and illegally imported medicinal products.

In his acceptance speech, General Sitole said the sword symbolises standing of authority by Member States, protection of communities across the region and equally serving them. He also said the sword is a sign of future succession as it will pass from one generation of policing to another.

General Sitole pledged to serve the region with zeal during his tenure as chairperson of SARPCCO.

Harness Strategic Partnerships Deputy Commissioner Operations

he Deputy Commissioner of Police, Operations, Mr Solomon Mantswe has said that a high performing organisation is determined by a workforce that is highly focused on desire to achieve outstanding results.

Mr Mantswe made the remarks when addressing police officers in Kang and Gantsi just days shy of Christmas Day. He pointed out that yielding desirable results does not come easy therefore, requires collaboration and innovation to produce work at the highest levels.

The Deputy Commissioner further urged the officers to innovate together within their different areas of operation in order to crack down crime syndicates that threaten peace of the inhabitants of this country.

Hesaidcracking down of criminal groups could be achieved if police officers review crime prevention strategies regularly as well as resuscitating Cluster Policing programme so that they continue yielding positive results.

Mantswe further encouraged officers the develop more response teams strengthening agency inter cooperation. He added that would crime steadily go within down their areas of responsibility if they engage with other stakeholders in fighting crime.

The Deputy Commissioner expressed appreciation at how police of ficers continue to deliver diligently in

apprehending offenders and bringing them to justice.

He implored them to raise their level of consciousness and never leave any stone unturned and investigate cases thoroughly for possible prosecution of the perpetrators.

Deputy Commissioner Mantswe also

extended his address to police officers in Tsabong where he urged them to harness strategic partnership that would aid the organisation to improve on its Gender Based Violence (GBV) prevention and response measures.

Mr Mantswe urged them to collaborate with stakeholders in their respective policing areas so that established measures yield results in curbing incidents of GBV. He said that GBV is a national concern and mostly women and children are victims in cases like rape and defilement.

Mr Mantswe further emphasised the need to constantly involve critical organisations that deal with children so that cases that involve young persons are given the attention they deserve.

The Deputy Commissioner urged the officers to educate parents and guardians of children on issues of GBV and encourage them to report any suspicious incidents of GBV, adding that by so doing perpetrators of such will be apprehended and brought to justice in time.

On a different note, Mr Mantswe encouraged the officers to get vaccinated for Coronavirus. He said that getting vaccinated does not only reduce the risk of COVID-19 spread and health complications in the work place, but also plays a critical role in operational efficiency.

SARPCCO Chairperson Pays Courtesy Call on Honourable Minister Mmusi

he Minister of Defence, Justice and Security Honourable Thomas Kagiso Mmusi has acknowledged bilateral ties between Botswana and South Africa as demonstrated by the existing collaborations across various sectors of the economy, including public security.

Mmusi made acknowledgement in Gaborone recently during a courtesy call by the Chairperson of Southern African Regional Police Chiefs Cooperation Organisation (SARPCCO), General John Khehla Sitole who is also the National Commissioner of South African Police Service (SAPS).

He said that Botswana Police Service (BPS) and SAPS continue to enjoy mutual benefits in terms of tackling emerging transnational organised crimes. He further stated that such crimes have the potential to affect the economies of the two countries. The Minister added that the cracking down of criminal syndicates operating across borders is critical in ensuring peace and security in the region.

Hon. Mmusi also noted with appreciation a robust security collaboration beyond the borders of the two countries as exhibited by the active participation in peacekeeping and conflict resolution missions in the SADC region and continent.

"As the Minister responsible for security matters. I commit to peace building efforts within and across our borders to the benefit of our communities."

For his part, General Sitole praised the cordial relationship that exists between BPS and SAPS in terms of providing safety and security in the region. The Chairperson said that transnational organised crime continues to threaten regional peace and security. He therefore called on SARPCCO member states to intensify their crime reduction strategies in order to have a safe region that would be a benchmark model in policing circles.

Commisioner Sitole said that he was aware of how COVID-19 impacted economies of countries across the region. "One of the major focus of SARPCCO is to support and revive the economies of various countries by aligning members policing strategies to each other to create a conducive climate for economic growth as well as luring investors to the region."

He also noted that the organisation supported countries affected by public through stabilisation disorder facilitation of return to normal processes, citing Mozambique as an example. General Sitole said that they intend to mobilise countries to have high density deployment in those countries that have unrest situations.

Earlier on, in his introductory remarks, the Commissioner of Botswana Police Service, Mr Keabetswe Makgophe appreciated the unwavering support BPS continues to receive from SAPS. He said BPS has made several breakthroughs in arresting criminals of various offences through the interventions of SAPS and INTERPOL, something that he said they should be commended for.

In her remarks, Acting Secretary for Safety and Security in the Ministry of Defence, Justice and Security, Ms Boikhutso Botlhole emphasised the importance of a police organisation in any country, adding that a resourced Police Service can effectively deliver on its mandate. Ms Botlhole said the visiting of SARPCCO Chairperson to Botswana is an indication that Police Services across appreciate the importance of collaborations in combating crime.

SARPCCO Chairperson was in Botswana to attend a two-day monitoring meeting for the implementation of SARPCCO resolutions that were reached on the 16th June 2021 in Gaborone, Botswana. He was accompanied by senior officials from SAPS and also a delegation from NCB Harare.

Crime Prevention in Full Swing

n an expedition to combat stock theft in their policing area, Sejelo Police in Kanye hosted a crime prevention workshop in Selokolela under the theme, "Lets join hands and fight against stock theft."

The objective of the event was to sensitise farmers on the status of stock theft and encourage them to resuscitate Farmers Committees for formulation implementation and of relevant strategies to the area.

Speaking at the event, Professor Keitseope Nthomang who was the guest speaker and Chairman of Lorolwane/Gasita Farmers Association urged farmers to desist from the tendency of leaving livestock in the open at night as this makes them easy targets.

On another issue, Professor Nthomang highlighted the importance of acquiring work permits for their employees in the case of hiring foreigners. "As an Association, we strongly condemn the hiring of foreign herdsmen without following the right procedures as this has the potential of contributing to cross boarder stock theft."

On general crime, Professor Nthomang

expressed concern about parents who turn a blind eye when their children accumulate stolen properties stating that it is important for children to be given a good foundation.

"Families are the building blocks of the society, if children are not reprimanded from a young age then we are a lost nation."

In his welcome remarks earlier on, Kgosi Keorapetse Legabala of Selokolela village said some farmers leave their livestock in the responsibility of herdsmen for a long time, advising that this can escalate stock theft. He also advised farmers

to follow the right procedures when buying and selling livestock as this helps in tracking and identifying the owner.

On the statistics, Officer Commanding No. 14 District, Senior Superintendent Banneetse Keakile said there was an increase in stock theftcases as they realised an increase of 22% in 2021 as compared to the previous year.

In her remarks, Senior Administration

Officer at Kanye Administration Authority, Mrs Keneilwe Seidisa said in the year 2021 they have received over 200 cattle at Gasita Matimela kraals but only 45 were claimed. She said this indicated that farmers care less about the whereabouts of their livestock.

Meanwhile, Ramotswa Police Station organised a business community workshop to warn participants on crime related to businesses that usually occur during the festive season.

Delivering a keynote address, Training Officer at Security Systems, Ms Alice Mwanza advised the business community to secure their property by installing security gadgets like alarms, CCTvs and many others.

She encouraged them to participate in business cluster committees which have proven to be effective in fighting crime. Ms Mwanza called on the business community to desist from keeping large sums of money at their businesses as this can attract criminals.

She advised them to utilise available security banking services to deposit their money from time to time.

When briefing the participants on crime situation, Station Commander for Ramotswa, Superintendent Keoagile Tau said they registered 30 cases of Store Breaking in 2021, marking an escalation of 10% in comparison to 2020.

The Station Commander said proximity of the village to the Capital city makes it vulnerable to advanced and sophisticated crime which calls for a multifaceted approach by all stakeholders.

Retracing the Roots of Kachikau Police Station

achikau village is in the Chobe District and situated about 35 kilometers from Ngoma Border Post. The border post divides Botswana and Namibia. The people and wild animals here, co-exist as they are attracted to the ecosystem of the mighty Chobe River that flows through the region.

Police operations in the area dates back to the colonial era and were often moved back and forth between villages to avert situations such as flooding river plains, poor terrains, tsetse fly and human wildlife conflict. A case in point was the relocation of a police station between the villages of Kachikau and Kavimba.

Kgosi Mmualefe Mmualefe of Kachikau said, the first police post in Chobe enclave was built in the early 1950's at Matlhabanelo, an area in the periphery of Kachikau. It comprised of four single roomed mud and grass thatched houses.

He stated that as a result of frequent flooding at Mathabanelo, the Police Post was moved to a high ground at Kachikau village.

Once again, a decision was taken to relocate the Post to a place called Lungara near Kavimba where a mini Police Station was built in 1969 and was occupied in 1970. This time, the move was influenced by lack of palatable water at Kachikau.

"There were unconfirmed reports which suggested that the Post was moved to Lungara, to provide security to a grave of one of the members of the London Missionary Society, who died after he was attacked by bees. We believed this to be true as the station was built close to the grave", said Kgosi.

Police Magazine caught with retired Superintendent Balisi Ntamba get to chronicle of events as he took over the reign as Station Commander Kavimba at 2001. Throughout the interview, he recalled fondly his experiences at Kavimba.

"I remember that when I arrived at Kavimba there were eight police officers being myself as Station Commander, a sub Inspector, one sergeant and five constables," he disclosed.

He said the police station was located six kilometres away from the village of Kavimba making it difficult for members of the public to access police services.

He indicated that back then officers were faced with challenges such as unavailability of power supply, unpalatable water and poor communication system. At times officers had to travel 91 kilometers to Kasane to access some of the basic amenities.

Mr Ntamba also recalled the times when they would travel from Kavimba to Mabele and climb atop trees to make phone calls.

For electricity supply, the station relied on the generator to electrify the station and police houses.

The other challenge was that the area was infested with dangerous wild animals that passed by the station daily on their way to drinking spots in the Chobe River.

"My house was located near the

riverbank, which made it a frequent resting place for wild animals and on many occasions, I had to drive them away with the help of other officers for me to go to work and when coming back home," said Superintendent Ntamba.

Meanwhile, there were fewer criminal cases probably because police services were not easily accessible as the station was far from the village. For one to report a crime, they had to travel long distances by lifts, lest they fell prey to predators such as lions.

Before Superintendent Ntamba took over the station, it was commanded by officers of the rank of Inspector, making him the first Senior Officer to be Station Commander at Kavimba. He took over from Inspector Nkape Kealotswe.

Meanwhile, after the police had settled at Lungara, then came an issue of wildlife posing a threat to the community. It was decided that the station should be moved from the area, and it was taken back to Kachikau, where it currently stands.

After a period of over 30 years, the construction of a magnificent Police Station that stands majestically on the upper ground facing the village of Kachikau started in 2007.

A year later, police officers who were at Kavimba moved to the new building in Kachikau which was officially opened on 14th March 2009 by the then Botswana Defence Force Commander Lieutenant General Tebogo Masire.

He was succeeded by Superintendents; Museke Samasasa and the current Situme Budani who took over in 2016.

According to Superintendent Budani, his policing area covers five villages of Kachikau, Kavimba, Mabele, Satau and Parakarungu. Crime is relatively low in the area save for incidents of poaching, unlawful possession of dagga, defilement, isolated incidents


relating to assaults and thefts. These offences are committed by both local and foreign nationals.

The Station Commander said that to combat crime in their area, they engaged in public education to sensitise the public.

He said they also held school outreach programmes to educate children on the consequences of indulging in criminal activities and encouraged them to report any offences committed against them.

On issues of cross border crimes, Superintendent Budani said they have a Botswana/Namibia law enforcement committee, where they meet and draw plans on how best they can deal with crime in their areas. They then do annual plans, operations, roadblocks and kgotla meetings together in both countries interchangeably.

"This has yielded good results as criminals who cross the border are always taken back to their country of origin to answer for their criminal activities committed there without any hardships", said Mr Budani.

PEOPLE SMUGGLING STING OPERATION:

KENYA-NETHERLANDS COOPERATION LANDS RENOWNED FUGITIVE IN JAIL

enyan Police have arrested a man wanted by INTERPOL for allegedly smuggling dozens of men, women and children to Europe.

Wanted by The Netherlands since 2017, 53-year-old John Habeta was taken into custody at Schiphol International airport in Amsterdam on 25 December after his arrest in Kenya.

Kenyan Police arrested John Habeta in Nairobi on 16 December as part of a sting operation coordinated between authorities in the Netherlands and Kenya with the support of INTERPOL's General Secretariat headquarters.

Acting on globally sourced INTERPOL intelligence leads, the INTERPOL National Central Bureau (NCB) in The Hague alerted the Kenyan NCB to the fugitive's presence in Nairobi on 10 December.

An INTERPOL Red Notice - or international fugitive alert - was published the same day for people smuggling and use of fake identity documents to carry out transcontinental smuggling operations, triggering the suspect's surveillance and arrest on the outskirts of the Kenyan capital.

The Dutch national remains in custody in The Netherlands until trial where, if convicted, he faces a sentence of up to eight years in prison.

Complex criminal networks facilitate the illegal passage of migrants across borders - for a price.

Using INTERPOL's secure global police communications network -I-24/7, INTERPOL coordinated global efforts to disrupt the network by enabling countries to share criminal intelligence and analysis about Habeta and how he organized transcontinental smuggling operations.

Habeta was allegedly involved in at least four different operations to smuggle groups of Eritrean nationals into Europe using routes from Asia.

INTERPOL's specialized unit on migrant smuggling and human

trafficking identified Habeta as a high priority target in October 2020 when member countries alerted INTERPOL to new leads about the fugitive's global smuggling activities, which were immediately shared with the NCB in The Hague.

The subsequent issue of the INTERPOL Red Notice played a central role in the location and arrest of the fugitive.

People smuggling syndicates are run like businesses with high profit margins and links to a wide range of serious and often violent crimes including illicit money flows, corruption, terrorism, trafficking in illicit goods and human trafficking.

They focus on profit margins, facilitating the passage of migrants with little or no regard for their safety and well-being. International police cooperation

Criminal groups behind human trafficking and migrant smuggling were already hit last July when INTERPOL's operation Liberterra saw 286 suspects arrested worldwide.

In April, Operation Weka mobilized 24 source, transit and destination countries enabling authorities in Africa and Europe to rescue nearly 500 victims of human trafficking and identify some 760 irregular migrants.

Both operations boosted regional law enforcement cooperation into people smuggling and triggered associated police investigations in all continents into targets like Habeta.

This latest investigation was supported by The Regional Operational Centre in support of the Khartoum Process and the African Union (AU) Horn of Africa Initiative (ROCK) and Europol.
