BPS HOLDS 51st ANNUAL SENIOR OFFICERS CONFERENCE

Senior police officers around the country converged at the Special Support Goup for the Botswana Police Service (BPS) 51st Annual Senior Officers Conference this May 2025. The Conference serves as a vital forum for reflection, innovation and formulation of effective strategies. It was held under the theme: Innovative Approaches in Modern Policing; Closing Gaps and Building Trust.

The event was graced by the President of the Republic of Botswana, Advocate Duma Gideon Boko, who officially opened the Conference. This was the President's first address to the conference since his assumption the highest office.

Also present at the occassion were the Minister for State President, Honourable Moeti Caesar Mohwasa, who is responsible for the Police amongst others, the Permanant Secretary to the President Ms Emmah Peloetletse and Ms Matshidiso Bokole, Deputy Permanant Secretary to the President. This year, the conference was different from previous ones because delegates included station commanders and their equivalent.

In his address, Advocate Boko said although modern advances such as globalisation and Information Communication, Technology (ICT), positively influence human and socioeconomic development, a catalyst for the increase in crimes such as terrorism financing, money laundering and cybercrime which are threats to public safety and security.

The President said the scenario called for the BPS to strengthen security collaboration with other law enforcement agencies so as to mitigate the effects of emerging sophisticated

crime. He called for a decisive transition toward technology-enabled policing in response to these emerging challenges. He emphasised the need to expand the deployment of drones for surveillance purposes as well as implementing digital reporting platforms to streamline processes and minimize reliance on manual documentation. "Accelerate the installation of Safe City cameras to enhance urban surveillance and strengthen crime prevention efforts. Augment human capability through technology to improve service delivery.

The President reminded the delegates that their duty to the people of Botswana was to cultivate a policing system that is not only efficient and responsive but also compassionate, communityfocused, and grounded on the highest principles of professionalism and ethical conduct. Advocate Duma Boko assured the BPS leadership that government will continue to collaborate with key stakeholders to tackle emerging criminal trends and other pressing social issues of national importance.

He expressed hope that the Conference would generate valuable insights and innovative solutions to effectively address safety and security challenges. The President reminded police officers to uphold the highest standards integrity, professionalism, impartiality, responsiveness, respect and merit in the discharge of their duties. "I urge all of you to prioritize the preservation of human life by respecting human rights and consistently operating within the realms of the law when executing your duties."

her welcome remarks, Commissioner of Police, Commissioner Dinah Marathe informed the President

and his delegation that crime in the country was still manageable. She said total crime recorded shows reduction in 2024 compared to 2023. In the same vein Penal Code offences, violent and serious crime also went down by 11% and 15 % respectively. The Commissioner also shared road safety statistics, highlighting that there was a 12.6% reduction in road fatalities from 396 in 2023 to 346 last year.

Despite these noticeable gains realised, the Commissioner bemoaned the level of violence and brutality used by perpetrators during the commission of offences like murder, rape and robbery which she said was a cause for concern. She also singled out notable factors like driving without due care and attention,

driving at high speed, driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs and careless driving as some of the major contributors to road accidents in the country.

As response measures to crime and road safety, the Commissioner stated that BPS would continue to employ initiatives that included but not limited to; community policing, law enforcement, use of technology to enhance crime investigation and detection as well as public education. She assured President Boko that BPS remained committed to aligning its strategies with the national priorities by embracing innovation and reengineering processes for a peaceful and conducive environment to foreign direct investment.



WALK AGAINST GENDER BASED VIOLENCE

he United Congregational Church of Southern Africa (UCCSA) Trinity Church in Gaborone recently organised a Walk Against Gender-Based Violence (GBV) followed by a workshop aimed at raising awareness about the pervasive issue. The event brought together community members, church leaders, and government officials in a powerful show of unity and commitment to ending all forms of violence.

Among the notable participants were the Minister of Youth and Gender Affairs, Honourable Lesego Chombo, and the Commissioner of Police, Dinah Marathe, whose presence underscored the seriousness of the issue and the need for collective action.

Speaking at the conclusion of the walk, Minister Chombo described GBV not only as a social issue but as a moral and spiritual crisis that requires urgent

and sustained attention. She expressed concern over the high incidence of GBV in Botswana, placing the country among the most affected in Africa.

Minister Chombo urged Batswana to challenge harmful cultural and societal norms that perpetuate violence, to advocate for protective policies, and to speak out against injustice. "I urge every individual to rise and stand against gender-based violence and take a stand against injustice for a safer society," she said.

She also reaffirmed her Ministry's commitment to supporting education and awareness programmes that address the root causes of GBV, empowering citizens with the tools to prevent and respond to such violence.

For her part, Commissioner Dinah Marathe of the Botswana Police Service (BPS) echoed Minister Chombo's call to action, reaffirming the BPS's unwavering commitment to public safety and support for GBV survivors.

She highlighted the importance of creating victim-friendly facilities that ensure safety, confidentiality, and access to services for those affected. "As law enforcement, we are dedicated to expanding our services to establish victim-friendly spaces that uphold safety and confidentiality," Commissioner Marathe stated.

She also identified cultural beliefs, economic hardship, and substance abuse as some of the root causes of GBV, noting that in many cases, perpetrators are individuals known and trusted by the victims. The stigma and fear associated with reporting abuse, she added, continue to hinder justice despite increasing awareness.

Commissioner Marathe emphasized the need for collaborative efforts across government, communities, and individuals to tackle GBV at its roots and strengthen support systems for survivors.

Highlighting the rise in violence linked to broader criminal activities, Commissioner Marathe pointed to the important role of the church in crime prevention. She urged faith-based organisations to address the underlying causes of violence by promoting mutual respect, love, and healthy relationships. She also encouraged initiatives such as premarital counselling, youth development programmes, and other community outreach efforts to help shift attitudes and behaviours.

The workshop was held under the theme:

"Empowering by Faith, United in Purpose – Transforming Communities and Systems for a Just and Hopeful Future."





CZECH REPUBLIC AMBASSADOR PAYS **COURTESY CALL TO BPS**

otswana Police Service (BPS) continues to engage stakeholders and organisations beyond the country's borders to share ideas, forge partnerships strategic to develop effective crime prevention strategies. capacitate employees in key areas and to strengthen international cooperation in law enforcement.

In line with this commitment, the Acting Commissioner of Police, Mr Solomon Mantswe, recently hosted the Czech Republic Ambassador to Botswana His Excellency Mr Tomas Ulicny, the of, for a Courtesy Call aimed at exploring areas of collaboration in fighting crime.

In his welcome remarks, the Acting Commissioner described the visit as a golden opportunity for enhancing bilateral law enforcement collaboration. He emphasised Botswana's commitment to international peace and security through its active membership in global bodies such as the United Nations and INTERPOL. The BPS, he said, remains focused on strengthening partnerships both locally and internationally to combat crime effectively.

The Acting Commissioner acknowledged ongoing challenges posed by globalisation and cyber threats.

He said that to tackle such modern crimes, the BPS has established a Cyber Forensics Branch and is seeking support in building capacity in this area. Mr Mantswe also called for cooperation in sharing of intelligence, communication systems, and enhanced traffic law enforcement.

The Acting Commissioner further appealed for assistance in expanding Safer City surveillance technologies which currently face limited coverage due to funding limitations. Mr Mantswe expressed confidence that the meeting would lay a solid foundation for strategic cooperation, ultimately contributing to safer communities and stronger digital security.

For his part, His Excellency Ulicny pledged support BPS in key law enforcement areas, particularly cybercrime, police training and traffic law enforcement. The Ambassador said the Czech Republic has built robust systems to deal with traffic-related offences, including speed control and overweight vehicles. He shared that, like Botswana, the Czech Republic handles heavy transit traffic due to its central location in Europe which require complex coordination between law enforcement agencies and local authorities.

Mr Ulicny emphasised that road safety remains a top priority and that the Czech model, which integrates enforcement, record systems, and inter-agency coordination, has proven effective and could benefit Botswana. He stressed that the success of these systems lies not only in technology but also in the development of appropriate legislation and enforcement standards.

Ambassador Ulicny further stated that the growing global digital threats in space noted calls for stronger cyber security capacities. He assured BPS that his country is also interest in cooperating with BPS in digital forensics, secure communication channels, and cybercrime investigations.

He also offered to assist in capacity-building through the Czech Republic's experienced training units, highlighting areas such as defensive and police operational tactics, firearms training, tactical first aid, K9 (dogs) breeding and training.


The refurbished Post was handed over to BPS at a vibrant and optimistic ceremony graced by the Assistant Minister of Communications and Innovation, also Member of Parliament for Gaborone North, Honourable Shawn Nthaile. The event marked a significant milestone in the ongoing Adopt a Police Station initiative.

In his keynote address, Assistant Minister Nthaile said the refurbishment of the Police Post demonstrate a solid partnership between the Police and private sector in the fight against crime. He highlighted that the rapid growth of Phakalane as a residential and economic hub, demanded significant increase in public safety and property security initiatives.

The Assistant Minister urged companies and individuals with the means and expertise to demonstrate social responsibility by contributing community development and economic advancement. "To date, 70 police facilities have been adopted by various companies, with refurbishments completed at seven locations, including Phakalane. He appreciated the refurbished facility adding that there was need for further improvement to address evolving urban crime in the area. Honourable Nthaile reaffirmed government's commitment to inclusive engagement and equitable resource allocation, calling on citizens to actively contribute towards shaping Botswana's future.

Acting Commissioner of Police, Solomon Mantswe embarked on a tour of the International Law Enforcement Academy (ILEA) in Otse on (14/05/2025) to familiarise himself with the operational functions, accomplishments and challenges faced by the Academy.

ILEA, which was established in 2000, is a partnership between the governments of the United States of America and Botswana providing training for law enforcement officers across the African continent to combat transnational organised crime, terrorism, cybercrime, drug trafficking, human trafficking and financial crimes.

When addressing the ILEA staff, he said fostering positive relations between the governments of the United States of America and Botswana was also imperative. He observed that the ongoing partnership offers mutual support and reinforces bilateral ties.

In his address, Mr Mantswe said Botswana Police Service (BPS) will continue to provide support to ILEA to facilitate the seamless operation of ILEA Gaborone by maintaining its essential role of providing effective training, knowledge sharing, and skill development, which are crucial for tackling the complex security challenges encountered by the global community.

As a beneficiary and partner nation, the Acting Commissioner noted that Botswana is determined to utilise the training opportunities, to enhance its capacity and capability in addressing criminality that threatens public security. He said it was important for law enforcement officers to uphold ethical standards in safeguarding human rights.

Mr Mantswe informed the staff that the current government has prioritised public security as an important element that fosters national peace, stability, and socioeconomic development. He, therefore, encouraged the staff to align with the new government's vision priorities, which also aim to protect citizens' rights.

For her part, Managing Director ILEA, Senior Assistant Commissioner of Police Thateng Ludo Johwa-Mpundisi, acknowledged that ILEA Gaborone has trained over 18,000 law enforcement officers and justice personnel since its inception. She also appreciated the stewardship and guidance offered by the BPS leadership.
